B. Project report

1. Objectives

The two objectives of the Pathfinder peer grant are the following:

- To stabilise the network connectivity in Pathardi village comprising of 5 hamlets.

This objective has been partially achieved. The Radio Frequency planning is complete and we now know the exact location where we are going to set up towers and the devices. We are in the last stage of this and we are hoping that by the week of 10 Nov we will be able to start the network deployment.

To train the women in the community about digital skills and they in turn would go around the village to train the others in the village. The main aim of this objective would be to adopt a women driven approach to bring about digital ecosystem in Pathardi village.

We have achieved this objective in totality. I will share pictures of Anjali as well as a video. Anjali as a banking correspondent is doing very well. The links to the photos and videos about Anjali's banking activities in the village is shared below. After she has become the banking correspondent, people in the village do not have to travel long distances to withdraw cash, check their bank balance. Anjali generates her income by charging a certain amount from the services like mobile phone recharges, bill payments, cash withdrawal etc. The total turnover from banking transactions in the months of July, August, September is INR 2,287,72 or USD 3,188 and she has generated a total income of INR 8115 or USD 114 in the three months. We are also inducting Ms. Monica Pawar as a Village Level Entrepreneur. Both of them are known as E-Dosts in our community network. E-Dosts are digital friends in the village.

Strengthen the community networks movement through peer learning and capacity building	We contributed to this objective through the following activities - Visited Janastu community network and learnt a lot about intranet mesh network, the relevance of community radio and community entrepreneurship models that can help in sustaining the network.		
	- We also conducted a technical training of women from our community network. This was a two day training in which the local women learned about how the network can be set up, what entails for the operation and maintenanceof the network and how people in the community can contribute to the upkeep of the network. This was a part of our activity on capacity building.		
	- We learnt a lot from Janastu community network and want to implement a lot of things from our learnings. We are planning to implement the community radio in our community network at Pathardi village. The backpack version of the community radio can be used by the digital correspondent Anjali to broadcast to the village where she would be stationed for that day in the village. This will reduce her walking from house to house and asking if people in the village need any assistance with egov services. She is also enabling the banking facilities in the village. The community radio will help her in this. We are also going to use the application built by Janastu for the local access server. Through this application the contents in the server can be viewed as well as shared by people in the village through their smartphone. Janastu will also help us in the offline intranet mesh network and train the villagers about the operation and maintenance.

This will help us in replicating this model in many

As a part of the movement building, we are constantly communicating with the village administration and the tribal department to help finance connectivity in the village local self government office.

Many more villages are now coming forward to understand how their villages too can seed the growth of community networks and use the connectivity meaningfully. In this direction, we are creating eDosts (or digital friends) within the village. These eDosts are youths from within the village who have some IT training. We are giving preference to girls for a basic reason that they can help the women in the village in learning digital skills. We found that most of the women in the village are hesitant to learn digital skills from men.

We are also discussing with the district administration to begin funding the connectivity at the village local self government office. We are also discussing with the local ISPs to reach the last mile. Other options like cable TV operators, local youth in the village are being asked to become entrepreneurs who can take the connectivity to the villages and communities.

Support innovative technology use and approaches that enable scaling and sustainability of community networks

We are supporting innovative technology use by adopting a mix and match of technologies like community radios, offline intranet mesh network, online support center for the use of the village community, developing applications for sharing and accessing content from the local access server.

On the sustainability of community networks we are working on the Public-Private-Panchayat partnership model in greater detail. We are working with private telecom operators to enable connectivity in the remote rural villages as well as local ISPs. For sustainability of the network income generation through online and off connectivity is very essential. We are working on enabling various entrepreneurship models. These entrepreneurship models will help us in making the network sustainable. We looked into the ground realities and have developed the entrepreneurship models based on them. We found that the community artisans and crafters face the problem of marketability of their art and craft and lack of resources to make the art and crafts. So Gram Marg and BAIF called for a meeting and discussed with the artisans how we can help them in becoming entrepreneurs. From the discussion we came out with two different models which we are rolling out on the field currently. One model is the family run entrepreneurship model and the other is the group entrepreneurship model. In the family run entrepreneurship model, families which are involved in the domain of art and crafts are selected and they are asked to make things which are bought by us. In the group run entrepreneurship model, many like minded people gather in a

group and make the products. The reason why different types of models are adopted, is to see how each model fares and what are the pros and cons of adopting such models. It is also observed that most of the arts and crafts being traditional are passed down from one generation to the other. Thus the secrets are not shared with others. Thus the family run model of entrepreneurship model is being tested on the field.

The online peer meetings with Talant has also been a good way to share ideas and see convergence with other Asia peers.

The telegram group set up for the CN women has been a good gesture for sharing our thoughts and activities around gender in community networks. It has been very interesting to be a part of this group and see commonalities between women from different parts of the world. One thing that I have felt being in this group is to see how we think similarly and face similar situations in our own

We will be making mud huts, helping them in paddy threshing, drawing water from the well, herding cattle, cooking after collecting firewood, learning their local culture like Warli painting, paper mache masks, bamboo crafts etc. We plan to have a bonfire in the night, star-gazing and cooking together. Gram Marg and BAIF will also participate in CNX and multistakeholder event to be conducted by Janastu. After the CNX, we plan to visit Myanmar Community Network (ASORCOM). This visit was scheduled to be in the first week of November. But then we postponed it as we needed to apply for the German Visa to attend IGF at Berlin. Now the visit is scheduled to be after the CNX ie after 17th of Dec, 2019.

This training was given by DEF and it was a 3 day training. 12 women participated in the training and 5 men participated. This was a very nice training focusing on basic understanding of the connectivity form a lay man's perspective and alongside usage of connectivity. The sessions focused on both technical knowshow of the connectivity both online and offline. Shalini and Girlsh from Janastu too participated in this workshop and they guided the participants about Community radio and offline mesh network. • In a similar manner we also did training of identified skills amongst women related to art and craft. We conducted a one day workshop with women on Warli painting and how women can paint and sell their painting online. We did a detailed training of how to be innovative in making designs in the painting, clicking the right probasis on the painting, clicking the right probasis on the painting, selecting the right website, how to price products and how to maintain standards. 8 women participated in this workshop. • We also identified eDosts for taking ahead the digital ecosystem work in Pathardi. 4 eDosts have been identified from 4 hamlets of Pathardi. Amongst them 2 are women and 2 are men. We gave them training and also discussed with them how they will take ahead their work in the			
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	 After selecting the eDosts, we did a detailed Radio Frequency planning for setting up the network in Pathardi. This was a crucial achievement as this gave us an idea about how we will be setting up the connectivity in Pathardi. Deployment agency was then contacted and quotations from them were called for. Detailed discussion about how to set up the network etc was done. Anjali was identified as the banking correspondent in Pathardi village. Anjali was given training, facilitated with a biometric reader through Aadhar Enabled Payment System. BAIF handheld her for the initial months and slowly and steadily she picked up her tasks very well.

* What went very well in the project - what are you especially proud of?

To a series

Overall the project is going on very well. We are happy that Anjali is the banking correspondent in the village and she is empowered. Though the online and offline network is not set up yet, the people in the village are made aware of how they are going to create and share content through the offline local access server.

The CN peer exchange has been a very good initiative too. Not many projects have this included in the project. I feel that it is an important part of any project and yet overlooked. I am happy that this project has that component within itself. I myself learned a lot from the only peer exchange that I did. This was visiting Janastu community network. Many of the learnings from Janastu has been implemented in Pathardi community network as the requirements were very similar. I wanted to undertake one more peer exchange, but could not due to paucity of time.

I am also proud of making the villagers understand how connectivity can be made sustainable by their own initiative and involvement. Also the relevance of local resources and local infrastructure has been imparted to the community of which I am really proud of.

* What did not go very well, and why? What would you change or want to do differently if you were to do this project again?

The one thing that did not go well was the disbursement of funds by IIT Bombay. There are too many things to adhere to which makes it very difficult to keep the activities ongoing. Sometimes I had to put the money from my own pocket and get reimbursed for it later. Also rains played havoc for the past 4 months. During those months we would check the weather forecast and leave for the field. In the field, we would be drenched



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and work. It has been inspiring but challenging as well.

* What aspects of gender or women's participation have you explored during the project period or still have plans to do? What about people with disabilities, climate justice, indigenous people or land rights?

In this project we are focusing a lot on women's empowerment through rural livelihoods. We have enabled Anjali to become a E-Dost. In the similar way, we will be enabling Monica as a Village Level Entrepreneur. In addition to this we are also working with women in the self help groups to make art and craft with the available skills that they have with them.

We are also focusing on indigenous knowledge of the community. The community being a Warli tribal community we have appreciated their local knowledge about biodiversity and are trying to preserve the same through local knowledge creation and sharing. This is a part of the Catalytic intervention grant project.

* What activities still remain incomplete for the duration of this project and will be completed by 31 December 2019?

The activities that remain incomplete in this project are the following:

Pathfinder peer activity which needs to be complete in this project is the network deployment. We will be doing the same in the 2nd week of November after IIT Bombay has cleared all the bills and the devices have been procured. By the end of November 2019, we will have the entire network deployed both online and offline. For the entire month of December we will be able to show how the network is being used by the people in the village, how much of local content is generated and shared, how has connectivity impacted the lives of the people in Pathardi.

Peer exchange visit to Myanmar. This is scheduled to be after the CNX i.e. after the 17th of Dec, 2019.

Multi stakeholder event which is scheduled to be held on the 7-8 Dec in Pathardi.
